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FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR

When I was serving as a pastor at Abiding Savior in Milwaukee in the late seventies and early eighties we would make an annual trip to Six Flags Great America. At that time our trip was kind of a novelty. Even if many of the high school youth would go with their family or friends at another time during the summer, they would not want to miss our youth group's trip to the amusement park. Typically, we would connect with the group two times during the day, once around lunch and once around dinner and then meet the youth right before the park's closing. At the check-in times during the day we would hear various stories (mostly about good experiences), wait for some notorious late arrivals, and even hear from youth who had met other youth and young adults (particularly Great Lakes sailors) along the way. Still and all, by the end of the day we would bring the youth back safe and sound (as far as we knew), but having experienced both adventure and fun.

When I think of my interim experience at All Saints, this amusement park

experience comes to mind. It began for me with a lot of excitement, but just like for the high school youth who went to Great America every year, there was some "jumping through the hoops" on both sides. We had to meet halfway along the way. I have particularly enjoyed the Sunday morning worship experiences, what we might call the thrill rides. Christmas and Easter and confirmation Sunday have been particularly top experiences. There has been the opportunity to spend time with friends that I have made and I have met new friends along the way. At the end of the day, like at Great America, there will be a return home, knowing that I have shared a "day" with part of my Christian family.

Our "day" will reach nine months on July 20. There have been some ups and downs on our "day." I think of them like my favorite thrill ride at Great America, the wooden roller coaster, the American Eagle. One of those happened right away upon my arrival. On Monday evening, October 19th I had just finished my interim in Thiensville with a farewell reception held at the

church. The day before had been confirmation Sunday for six tenth grade youth. All Saints congregation had several weeks earlier (Sunday, September 27) had a major celebration for Pastor Larry Henning, with a full celebration of his retirement from regular ministry in the church. Neither of us probably started out on a high. But the weeks of getting to know one another were for me quite exhilarating. I found, and I still find, that the greatest value of any congregation is in the people who gather here. I enjoy getting to know people's names and their stories. I remember going to an early men's breakfast at Perkin's and feeling a bit overwhelmed, but knowing that each of the men gathered there were on their own personal journey, of which I would be a part for just a while.

I quickly discovered the second value of the congregation—music and worship. Like a roller coaster the experience had its twists and turns. I find the Feast of Life, for all of its wonderful music, to not be as immediately user-friendly as the Now the Feast liturgy and ELW Setting eight. All Saints, like the

other six congregations I have served as interim, has its own favorite songs and groups. I realized that there was certainly some individuality to All Saints, since there was no attempt to use exclusively what used to be called “the authorized worship book” of the church. But I have enjoyed the musical talent (even strings), the lectors (what great voices Jeff V. and Jon R. have and how great it is to have high school youth read), and the assistants (Tom W. is hard to beat as a singer in worship and Jackie C. can really handle those prayers—she will make a great pastor!)

Then there were the moments high up above Great America in their version of the Ferris Wheel (what my kids used to call “Tweety Bird cages”). Interim ministry includes what Gil Rendle and Alice Mann call “moving to the balcony.” In their book Holy Conversations they write: “balcony space describes taking a position sufficiently distant from day-to-day operations and worry in order to see the larger picture. Moving to the balcony allows leaders the necessary space and distance to learn and to diagnose the situation. Balcony space is where there is room for prayers and discernment for the congregation. Clergy and staff...must get at least one foot out of the congregation to think deeply about what is happening within the congregation and to dream of the fu-

ture.” As a transition specialist from the “Tweety bird cages” I can see where tweaks could be made in the congregation. I shared these in early December at our congregational town hall meeting. Certainly there is a congregation that values families greatly and youth. Yet there are so many demands made on today’s youth that at least from the balcony it appears a concerted effort will be needed to reconstruct the high school youth program. Professional assistance may be needed, but the third great value of the church can be realized in the families who are here, trying to have a program of value for all.

I found a fourth value of the church in openness, openness to new ideas and to other people. When we gathered early in 2010 to discuss the ELCA position on sexuality I discovered that there is a great degree of openness in a church beyond its location. Yet at the same time I wondered why there wasn’t more going out to share the good news which was experienced by all in the church. As I continue to look down from a little bit of distance I foresee so much more for All Saints, if each and every one gets excited about not just gathering, but also scattering.

At Thanksgiving and later in December I experienced a fifth great asset of the church, the outreach of social minis-

try. Requests to help the Songoro parish, the Meru diocese, and Hephatha congregation in Milwaukee were opportunities for ministry to which many people responded. Certainly there is a tradition for responding to the needs of others who are in need, which has been enhanced from the beginning of the newly renovated building in 2001-2002 with the relocation of the Kettle Moraine food pantry right here.

Before leaving the “balcony” I want to applaud a sixth great asset of the church, the leadership. The council has long been a strength at All Saints, owing greatly to the wholehearted commitment of many folks. Their contribution is immense and I applaud them. At the same time with a little distance to aid me I can see how that leadership needs to always be shared with others. It is said by those who study congregations that often the culture of the congregation is created in the first years of start-up. In this case I think part of the culture is to be “doers,” which like so many factors in an organization are the “greatest strength” and the “greatest weakness.” I trust that in the near future there will be a good mix of long-term and newer leaders in the congregation.

Moving down from the “Tweety bird cages” I experience the more mundane moments of the amusement park. There are times when you get

thirsty, times when you take a break, and times when you just have to drive in that slow car in a circle. It is too bad that All Saints have had four times already with the momentum and excitement of the full-fledged trip around the park has been interrupted by the need to slow down and get ready for a new pastor. Yet, as I recently told one of the parents of a newly graduated high schooler, this too is part of life. I hope that you have found value in slowing down with me, walking through the grief cycle which is really work (and not always fun), and in taking the opportunity to realize all that you have and are. With God’s guiding hand, the potential is great and can also be realized. All it takes is the commitment to take a risk, get on one more roller coaster ride, realizing that there are no guarantees, but it is worth it! May we all re-commit to our next ministry and to our ongoing service of the One who calls us to a greater kingdom than Great America. Meanwhile I am still enjoying a place where, as Garrison Keillor says at the end of his Prairie Home Companion monologue each week, “all the women are strong, all the men are good-looking, and all the children are above average.”

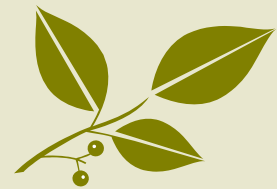

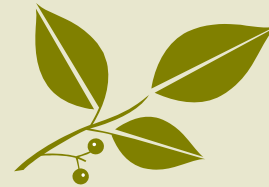

GREATER MILWAUKEE SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The 2010 assembly of the Greater Milwaukee Synod was held June 3-5 at the Country Springs Hotel and Conference Center in Pewaukee. Bill Neubert, Ron Bohrer, and Pastor Roger served as voting members at the assembly, which at the last count was made up of 163 rostered (clergy and A.I.M.s) persons, 195 laypersons, and 50 visitors. The assembly's theme, "Beyond The Walls" was highlighted at the opening worship with Bishop Jeff Barrow preaching and a rich mix of music from every tradition represented in the Greater Milwaukee Synod. This service served as the installation of the newly selected members of the Greater Milwaukee Synod staff, as the assembly welcomed as regular staff members Pastor Chuck Brummond (director of rostered leadership) and Ms. Rhonda Hill (director of discipleship). The service and the opening Thursday evening ses-

sion celebrated the tenth anniversary of the synod's anti-racism team. The short session featured a skit which portrayed various ways in which we fail to be open and hospitable to all people in the church. Questions for table discussion following the skit included: 1) What cultural walls might exist in your congregation, institution or team for someone who comes in from a different background or perspective?, and 2) if you have participated in anti-racism, anti-oppression work, how has it helped you go beyond the walls? The resulting discussion was lively and convicting as to how closed we tend to be in our own cultural traditions in the church.

Rev. Andrea DeGroot-Nesdahl gave the personalized version of the ELCA churchwide report of Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson. Discussion focused on two questions: 1) what, if anything, is most important about being a Lutheran to

you personally; and 2) of all the relationships with partnerships/congregations, etc. which of these is most important in your congregation's experience and why? The results of the first were salvation by grace through faith and the availability of the common person to read Scripture being what is most important. Most relationships to outside groups mentioned were ecumenical and community wide.

Elections were ratified and held for 2011 churchwide assembly voting members. Two regular resolutions were passed, one requesting the ELCA church council to cut down pension reductions and the second to help to bring about more youth participation in all levels of the church.

A special feature of this assembly was the Friday resource fair on "Beyond the Walls Ministries. It featured such groups as Outreach for

Hope, El Salvador and Meru ministries, health and wellness, Lutheran Campus Ministry, El Salvador, and Reconciling for Christ. A Friday evening banquet was held to honor those celebrating 25th and 50th anniversaries of ordination, as well as some others who serve God in various ways. The Saturday morning session featured the passage of the 2012-2013 budget and a presentation by Bishop Jeff Barrow, where he articulated his basis positions as the presiding bishop of our synod.

Thanks to Bill and Ron for attending the assembly as voting members and to everyone for their support. If you would like further information, do not hesitate to call any of the three voting members representing you in the larger church.

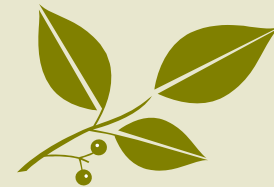
