

# Crossing the Chasm



## **Hephatha says, “God bless you,” to its neighbors.**

*From Outreach for Hope Lenten devotions:*

In the winter of 2025/2026, Hephatha Lutheran at 18th and Locust, went looking for a simple way to say “God bless you” to its neighbors—and found it right outside its doors. “We were seeking ways to share a ‘God bless you’ with our neighbors on 18th and Locust. We found a way,” one member shared. What began as a small act of service became a steady expression of faith lived out in the most practical way.

The young men who handle snow removal at the church began clearing not just the church sidewalks but the entire public block. As neighbors noticed, “It is often the only block with all of the snow cleared from the public sidewalk.” That consistency matters. In winter, cleared sidewalks mean safety, dignity, and easier daily movement. More than that, it quietly communicates something deeper: this church sees you, values you, and cares about your well-being.

That commitment continues today. “The young men will make sure that it continues... It remains an important way for us to say God bless you and the church cares about you to our neighbors.”

## Financial Update – January 2026

\*Report Accurate as of the end of January 2026, rounded to nearest dollar

Annual Budget - Expenditures: \$299,947.00

Monthly Budget – Expenditures (annual budget divided by 12): \$24,996

January Expenses: \$30,918

January Income\*\*: \$19,513

Income needed weekly to meet budgeted expenses

(annual budget divided by 52): \$5768

In the months of December '25 and January '26, our congregation received \$65,400 in annual gifts, which are gifts given by members who intend for this to be one-time giving for the year. To help us better understand our financial situation, we have allocated \$5450 (1/12 of this annual gift sum) into the total above of our January income, as these annual gifts are intended to support the congregation through the entirety of the year.

The total above that lists January income includes our \$5450 annual gift allocation plus other receipts in the month of January. As you can see above, our income in January of \$19,513 is below our budgeted expenses of \$24,996 by \$5483.

January expenses of \$30,918 were slightly higher than expectations, especially with two notable areas: Our snowplowing expenses for January were high with heavy snowfall (\$3420) and we also paid our annual Village of Wales fire fee in January (\$2428). In all other areas, expenses were within current expectations.


Point A to D = 2 miles

# Migration Stories

## Nancy Schultz

As one of the senior members of All Saints and a participant in the Monday night Circle Conversations for justice group, I am going to share some of my ancestry lineage. My name is Nancy Olsen Schultz. Almost everyone in the United States is an immigrant or an ancestor of immigrants, and my ancestors are of mostly Norwegian and German descent.

I am also 100% of Door County, WI background and culture. Both of my parents and one of my grandparents were born in the Door and they all lived there their whole lives. I was also born in Door County and lived in Juddville for my first 18 years of life until I left to attend college. I can trace my lineage to the second settlers in the Juddville area of the Door. My father's paternal grandfather, Hans Jacob Olson was born in 1837 and married Caroline Olsdr, born in 1839, and raised a family that included my grandfather, Nels Olsen, who was born 1876 in Norway. Hans and Caroline immigrated to America when Nels was three years old.

My father's maternal grandfather, Nicholas Kihl was born in 1844 in New York and moved to Wisconsin with his parents. As a young adult he served in the Civil War, enlisting in Company K of the 1st Wisconsin Infantry Volunteers. He was paid \$300 to take the place of a draftee, a procedure that was legal in those days. In 1869 he became the 2nd resident in Juddville, by purchasing some land on what is now the corner of Highway 42 and Peninsula Players Rd. There he planted the first cherry orchard in the northern Door. He married Ida Moses at age 32. My grandmother, Mercia Kihl was born in their little house on the farm in 1880.

# Migration Stories

## Nancy Schultz Continued

My grandparents, Nels and Mercia, married in 1898 and developed farmland near the original Kihl property and raised a family of 4 boys and 4 girls. Nels was employed as a fisherman who went out on the waters of Green Bay and Lake Michigan for weeks at a time, leaving Mercia and the family to tend the farm. My father, Olaf, and all his brothers and sisters attended the Juddville Elementary School for grades 1 to 8, where I also attended before heading to Gibraltar High School in Fish Creek.

I am proud of my Door County, hardworking immigrant heritage. My ancestors were not wealthy or prominent; however, with each generation, life became a bit easier. Isn't that the American Dream for all U.S. immigrants?
